Endangered Elements of the Periodic Table

Critical Thinking -As our supply of some essential elements dries up, it's time to start urban mining.

The periodic table is a very intelligent classification of elements called chemistry road map. **The first recognisable periodic table** proposed by **Dmitri Mendeleev** known as the **father of the periodic table in 1869**, on account of which we are celebrating **this year as International Year Periodic Table (IYPT) 2019 on its** completion of **150 years**.

This situation is attributed to the increasing use of elements like Lithium, Indium, Phosphorus etc which are soon entering the list of extinct elements. With the progress in technologies, the use of these materials have increased many fold within the last two decades As a result, these elements are rapidly converted into commodities from the ore and redistributing fundamental elements at such a rapid rate that many are already in short supply and will be completely exhausted within next few decades. Hence it is quite apparent that some of the naturally occurring elements have been under serious threat since a long time.

COLOUR COD	E AND THREAT LEVEL OF THE ABOVE CRITICAL THINKING PERIODIC TABLE
RED	Serious threat in next 100 years - Helium (He), Silver (Ag), Tellurium (Te), Gallium (Ga), Germanium (Ge), Zinc (Zn), Indium (In), Arsenic (As), Hafnium (Hf)

Helium, being the second most abundant element in the universe, used in wide range of applications including helium-filled balloons, and cooling magnets to very low temperatures in MRI machines, is facing depletition, not only due to the excess use, but also because being the lighter gas than air , it can easily escape the Earth's atmosphere. Recent studies show that nearly 40% i.e. **44 elements of the 118 elements** that make up everything are facing depleting (limited) supplies. These includes all of the rare earth elements, as well as zinc, gallium, germanium, helium, silver, phosphorus, Hg, Au, Cu, etc.

'**Endangered**' does not imply that the element will disappear from the Earth completely. It means that there will come a point when the supply of these elements will be limited or when it no longer remains economically viable to extract or use these elements.

To maintain steady supply of these essential elements, there is an urgent need to reframe our present understanding of mining and consumption, along with environment and waste management.
